The University of Scouting & Commissioner College will run from 7:45 a.m. until 4:15 p.m. Please review the table below for class times. #### What you need to know:

- -Registration will only be accepted online at www.trcscouting.org/university
- -Participants may register for courses in any of the colleges. For example, a Cub Scout Leader may register for a Scout BSA or General Studies or Venturing course. Our goal is for Scouters to increase their knowledge by experiencing the different areas of the Scouting program.

#### Venture Scouts and Scouts BSA age 14-21 may register as a Youth Participant.

- -Location: Shaker High School (445 Watervliet-Shaker Rd., Latham, NY 12110)
- **-Lunch Cost:** Options vary based on lunch selection. See below for details on lunch choices.

Lunch from Dinosaur BBQ is \$16.00 Lunch from Panera Bread is \$12.00 - \$14.00 (depending on selection) Or Bring your own lunch for free!

- **CPR & First Aid Fee:** Participants choosing to take the American Heart Association HeartSaver First Aid course will be charged a fee of \$ 20.00 per participant to cover the cost of certification. Participants choosing to take the American Heart Association Basic Life Support course will be charged a fee of \$30.00 per participant to cover the costs of that certification.

This year's registration fee for the University of Scouting and Commissioner College has been waived, however participants must still register online for course selections and lunch. Online Registration runs until March 16, 2020.

- **-Food:** There are three lunch options this year. During the online registration process you will be asked to pick lunch from three different options: Dinosaur BBQ Pulled Pork meal, Panera Bread or no lunch (you may bring a bag lunch with you or purchase lunch at an outside vendor in the area). Panera options include the Seasonal Greens Salad, Modern Greek Salad, Heritage Ham & Swiss Sandwich, Roast Turkey and Avocado Sandwich, Modern Caprese Sandwich, Steak and Arugula Sandwich or Napa Almond Chicken Salad Sandwich.
